PAT MILLER MEMORIAL

The following statement, written by Susie Kohout, contains excerpts from Nomination Form for the Meg McLane Advocacy Award submitted by LWV of Door County - April 2009:

Pat Miller learned advocacy at her father's knee. An advocate for social justice in Milwaukee during and after the Great Depression, he passed on his "passion for doing the right thing."

Whether as the first lay student at the Alverno convent school, creating the first positions in music therapy in Indiana Mental Institutions, or being a pioneer in religious education for the Chicago Catholic Archdiocese, Pat fought an

uphill battle creating places for women. She was an advocate for women's rights, social justice, and good government from her high school days.

Pat joined the Door Property Owners' Organization in Illinois in 1976. Moving to Door County in 1990, she continued working for DPO, joined the League of Women Voters and the Door County Environmental Council, and helped found the Whitefish Bay Neighborhood Property Owner's Association.

A pillar of the Door County League's Voter Service efforts year after year, Pat was best known in the community for her efforts as an observer and advocate for good government. Each month for more than 15 years, she attended approximately eight county government committee meetings, meetings of her town board, town planning committee, local school board and school district committees, as well as meetings of other pertinent governmental bodies.

Pat acquired a vast understanding of the workings of local government - sharing it with others and representing her various groups or herself as needed. She earned the respect of local officials and regular citizens because she was persistent, patient, positive, and a peace maker. Understanding and believing in the basic goodness of all individuals, she built consensus, never alienating people as she strove for greater democracy.
